Dear Parents, Carers and Students

We have written to and met with many of you so that you are fully informed of the changes that are happening at Park Hall Academy. We cannot disguise the fact that the examination results last year and the Ofsted Inspection in November were extremely disappointing. As sponsor, Arden has had to take control of the leadership and strategic management at Park Hall.

We have been working closely with the Park Hall Board of Governors and Senior Staff in order to move Park Hall forward with rapid pace. While we were greatly saddened by the recent Ofsted report, we believe there is no reason to be disheartened.

Education is currently undergoing major changes to examination structures both within the teaching curriculum and how students are examined. Standards have been raised particularly in English and Mathematics, all of which has received a great deal of media coverage. At Park Hall we have seen some remarkable improvements over the past four years, in fact; in May 2013 we received a letter from the Minister of State for Schools celebrating the fact that Park Hall was one of the top 100 most improved schools in the country. Despite the recent difficulties the skills of both academies will now be harnessed to move forward. Our challenge is to ensure our next Ofsted reflects this hard work and dedication, ensuring that the education of Park Hall students goes from strength to strength. These are very exciting times for every member of the Park Hall family – our students, parents and staff.

When we met parents in early January we made a pledge that together we will focus on the many opportunities available to further improve the outcomes and success of our students.

We must ensure the highest standards of behaviour, attendance, punctuality, dress, courtesy and work ethics as a pre-condition for effective learning. We believe the highest achievements occur in schools that are both orderly yet adventurous.

We will enhance the academic and positive behaviour culture that we believe is essential for success. We also want our most able students at Park Hall to benefit from the outstanding Arden Sixth Form as an entitlement.

We will embed across the Academy 'Clear, Challenging Expectations for all Students' as we must clearly understand what is core to our future success, namely providing outstanding teaching and learning underpinned by robust quality assurance and a determination to drive up standards.

We will introduce the academic and positive behaviour culture that we believe makes Arden so successful. We want our most able students at Park Hall to be able to attend the outstanding Arden Sixth Form as an entitlement.

This is a battle we firmly believe we WILL win. We have some fantastic ammunition in the shape of the best facilities we have come across in a school – anywhere. We have a really excellent teaching team; the student body is inspiring and simply brimming over with talent just waiting to be unleashed. We will further enrich the academic team with a number of important new appointments.

We also have some great news to share with you. It gives me great pleasure to announce that following the recent visit by Arts Council England, the Academy has been awarded the prestigious GOLD Arts Mark Award

Congratulations to everyone at Park Hall on this superb achievement but special mention must be made to recognise the hard work and excellent results achieved by the Arts team. More information on this impressive award and other successes are featured later in this magazine. That is not all we celebrate in this, our first edition, of the new 'Park Life' newsletter which I hope you enjoy reading.

#### **Dear Parents, Carers and Students**

The key to any school's success, indeed to any student's success is maintaining the right behaviour for learning. We are totally committed to enabling your child to get the best education and obtain the best job or access the course they need for a happy and comfortable future.

Any amount of exciting, stimulating learning can be planned but if students are not connected or focused they will not learn or develop. Having run successful schools, Mr Murphy and I cannot stress enough how important co-operation and good behaviour is to a young person's learning and school experience.

Behaviour at Park Hall will be rapidly improved over the coming months. All children will be expected to be on time and on task throughout the day. Students are expected to show great respect for each other and every member of staff.

Some students may not feel they are able or willing to abide by our requirements, however, we want everyone to learn and make rapid and sustained progress. It may be that some students choose not to continue with us if they do not wish to engage with all the exciting learning which we are offering.

Mobile phones are one of the major distractions from learning and we are therefore banning them from use in the building. Phones found in use will be confiscated and returned to students at the end of the day. Should the phone have to be removed for a third time it may only be collected by the student's parent or guardian. You may wish to share with your child just how inconvenient this will be. It IS however legal and provides a firm way to ensure that the school is for learning and future building and NOT texting or taking pictures.

Successful education is founded on a close, positive relationship with parents. In order to deliver a good education, parents are expected to work in partnership with the school and back our behaviour policy and sanctions.

We require all parents to fully support the discipline of the school, firstly as their contribution to Park Hall Academy becoming an outstanding centre of learning, but primarily to help young people understand that whilst

they have a right to a good education, with that right comes the responsibility to behave. Supporting school discipline will enable excellent teaching and allow your child to benefit now and in the future both socially and economically.

If students disturb the learning and progress of others they will be removed from the class to spend time reflecting on improving their behaviour for learning in a separate area of the school. We must not allow individuals to prevent or harm other students' learning. Clearly our expectation is that no child will choose to disturb the learning of others.

We expect polite co-operation, following instructions immediately and above all this term - every student is ON-TIME and ON-TASK.

started in Year 7 at Park Hall in the September of 2008. I had visited and considered many schools within the area before making this decision, but Park Hall was by far the most appealing – even more than Sutton Girls! Park Hall seemed enthusiastic, warm and welcoming - just what a young 11 year old needs from a school. I took my Maths GCSE a year early in Year 9, along with the rest of my class, getting a C grade on the foundation test. Unfortunately, due to circumstances beyond my control I wasn't able to take my higher exam until Year 11. In Year 10 I went on to take History, French, Art and Drama (which I studied after school), along with the compulsory subjects.

I left Park Hall last year with a total of eleven GCSEs; six B's and five C's. I wanted to do very well at A level, so I began looking for greater motivation.

I moved to the Arden Sixth Form in Knowle for KS5 in September and although it's an hour and a half bus journey away it's well worth it. I feel like I'm being challenged by the teachers to achieve my best and am being given many opportunities to better myself. I'm currently involved in an interview process to visit South Africa for four weeks over the coming summer. It's an opportunity few are lucky enough to be presented with. At Arden I now mentor two younger classes once a week during my free periods, which not only benefits the children I help, but me as well.

I'm taking four A levels at Arden; English Literature, Modern History, Psychology and Home Economics. A Levels are a huge step up from GCSEs - it's a culture change you just cannot prepare for... But, as long as you're determined and manage your time well, you WILL get through it.

As I mentioned it takes an age to get to and from Sixth Form, meaning I am out of my house before 7.00am and never get home until 5.00pm. I must admit I find it difficult, but it is worth it. I hope to be leaving Arden with some amazing A Level results that allow me to go to the university of my choice where I intend study English Literature with the hope of becoming a Fashion Journalist.

Although Arden is amazing academically with excellent individual support, it is very different to Park Hall. Park Hall was particularly good at 'pastoral care' - ensuring the wellbeing of its students... I know for me, they went above and beyond to ensure I was happy at home, as well as in school life, showing a level of care that you don't find at many schools.

I built some close ties with fellow Park Hall students too and I truly believe they'll remain lifelong friends. I also forged strong bonds with the teachers and if it wasn't for their support I don't think I'd be where I am today... Needless to say I'd like to thank them for all the help and support they've given me throughout the years.

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# Going For Gold Smashing the Arts Mark accreditation right out of the Park!

Park Hall's recent winning of the prestigious Arts Mark Gold award is all the more impressive because the accreditation was made upon the Academy's FIRST entry into the scheme! Scoring Gold represents a shining endorsement of the talent, hard work and dedication of Park Hall's students and staff within the fields of music, dance, drama, photography, art and design.

Arts Council England uses the
Arts Mark to evaluate and
celebrate the arts and cultural
provision of schools across the
country. To be rated at 'Gold' during
our very first assessment period is a
superb achievement and we are extremely
proud to be able to share this news with the
Park Hall community.

In order for Park Hall to receive the highest award of Arts Mark Gold, the Academy's Arts Department had to demonstrate that we could fulfil a set of strict criteria. Assessments were made

of our curriculum, qualifications and successes, as well as our extensive extra-curricular activities, which were judged to be at the highest level of achievement.

The winning of this impressive accreditation rounds off a fantastic year for our Arts Department.

Everyone at Park Hall is extremely proud of all the on-going work, achievements and accomplishments of our students and the Arts team. A big 'well done' goes out to every young artist and all the teaching team and staff involved.

Artsmark is Arts Council England's flagship programme to enable schools and other organisations to evaluate, strengthen and celebrate their arts and cultural provision. It is delivered by Trinity College London, with ten regional Bridge organisations driving participation. Any school, college or youth justice organisation in England can apply for accreditation. Artsmark is nationally recognised as demonstrating excellence in arts and cultural provision.

Holding Artsmark status demonstrates that a school or setting values the arts and culture. It raises the public profile of a school or setting in the eyes of prospective students, their families and across the wider community.

It also contributes to the cultural aspect of Ofsted's requirement that a school promotes students' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development.



Here at Park Hall Academy the Performing Arts Department continually strives to create an exciting curriculum for the students which moves with trend as well as tradition.

In September 2012 we introduced a new Thematic Curriculum at KS3 where Dance, Drama and Music will be taught through a combined method of delivery with exciting resources and the use of innovative performing arts pedagogy.

The concept of creating a more cohesive KS3 curriculum with the combination of the three different pathways, Dance, Drama and Music, is designed to engage in a style very much supported in Primary Education, thus making the transition to Park Hall seamless in a child's learning experience. For every unit each pathway is specifically devised by a dance, drama and music specialist who draws upon their own vocational experience to increase the opportunity of success when leading students through KS3 to course opportunities at KS4/5.







## Macbeth

Park Hall Academy students worked hard over many weeks to perfect their production of Macbeth for their moment of glory.

The infamous 'Scottish Play' explores the story of a tyrannous king and his gory rise to power in 15/16th Century Scotland. The play opens with three witches who make prophecies to Macbeth and his friend Banquo. They tell Macbeth he's going to be King, twisting his personality with greed and ambition, they then tell Banquo his children will also be Kings.

Macbeth's prophecy leads him to kill King Duncan, ensuring his ascent to the Scottish throne. He then sets out to kill both Banquo and his son Fleance to ensure he retains the Throne as long as possible; but Fleance escapes his father's fate. Next Macbeth moves on to plot against Macduff and his family, leading to a bloody civil war which sees Macduff triumph with the death of Macbeth himself. Malcolm, who is King Duncan's rightful heir, is then crowned King.

The Park Hall production was based upon the classical version of 'Macbeth' as originally written by Shakespeare, but the cast utilised dance and physical theatre to portray some of the scenes. For example, during Banquo's death and his later re-appearance as a ghost and during the final, tumultuous battle scene. The aim of using dance and physical theatre was to give the audience a better understanding of the play beyond the complex and often archaic 'Shakespearean' language, as well as demonstrating the expansive range of skills the cast possess... And of course simply to put on a great show!

Finally, I would like to talk about how The Shakespeare Schools' Festival has helped me develop as a student. Before doing Macbeth I lacked confidence when performing or speaking in front of a large audience. In realising my role in the play I have been able to develop that confidence by rehearsing in front of people, receiving feedback and then using the input to improve my performance and skills.

The Shakespeare Schools' Festival has given me the confidence to showcase my skills and has provided the opportunity to improve on my areas of performance where I was less strong, such as speaking on my own when on stage. I feel Macbeth has given me an extra push to try as hard as I can; to let go and to really give it all I've got! It has also helped me mix with other students of all ages, many of whom I was working with for the first time. The Shakespeare Schools' Festival has also helped me academically as it has given me a better understanding of Shakespearean language. I am now able to apply this expanded vocabulary of unusual words and phrases to my work in other lessons.



Art offers unique opportunities for students to reveal their potential, express their ideas, develop their imaginations, and investigate a wide range of images and artefacts. The individual engaged in an art activity, whether it is expressive, imaginative, productive, reflective or critical is developing knowledge: about themselves, others, culture, society, and about the interaction of these with ideas, processes, techniques and media. As such it is an invaluable part of the education of young people.

Art develops a visual language that complements other languages such as those used in mathematical, scientific, literary and factually based subjects. It encourages personal expression, imagination, sensitivity, conceptual thinking, and powers of observation, analytical abilities and practical-orientated attitudes. It is especially concerned with mental processes involved in visual and aesthetic experience and develops a range of skills and concepts that can be used throughout life. This fully justifies our commitment to art education.









### 'Fine'Art

I am currently studying Art, which is really great. The course involves a load of different things, such as researching artists' work, using numerous different media and taking photos.

We have already completed one project and are currently working on the second which will later lead to our final piece for the course. This final piece of work draws on projects we have done to-date, refining those ideas and selecting appropriate media and techniques. If needed there are catch-up sessions after school, providing a great opportunity for those who need to do extra work.

Park Hall's art facilities are extensive, and are very useful in providing us with a range of different options and media. GCSE art is brilliant, with some excellent teaching making it all the better and easier to get through!

#### GCSE Food

Our students currently do GCSE Food and will be taking their exam this summer. Students are working hard to develop some fantastic recipes. We also deliver a BTEC in Hospitality.

This vocational course sees our students cater for some of the many open events held at Park Hall.



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### Photography

Ryan Sherwin tells us why there's a great deal more to photography than merely 'point and click'.

GCSE Photography encompasses a wide range of topics. Many people embark on Photography as both a hobby and a GCSE course in Year 9.

Initially the teacher provides the starting point for projects. For example, a topic might be 'Natural Surfaces' and photographs would have to be taken of objects such as wood, leaves and grass that explore the way their surfaces interact with light, shade and colour. The second year of the two year course sees students get to choose from a variety of starting points, enabling them to develop ideas independently.

Before taking the Photography course, many people have preconceptions of what it is going to be like based on previous experience of snapping away with a camera or phone... But since starting the GCSE Photography course, I have learned that Photography is an artform in its own right. There are a lot of techniques covered during lesson time, such as traditional 'wet film' darkroom practices (these are quite scientific, involving a variety of chemicals, careful timing and use of enlargers - all of course undertaken in near, or total darkness), Photoshop (which enables you to edit and manipulate photographs in interesting ways) and the methods of other artists and technicians (we learn a lot about other artists and photographers and try to take inspiration from them). All this academic photographic study enables us to develop our own ideas as we become more confident with our camera and the projects we tackle.

So, taking Photography at GCSE Level really IS hard work as there's a lot to do, but I have to say I have really enjoyed the challenge and find the lessons fascinating as we learn and develop a range of useful new skills.

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# Creative Writing

This year students at Park Hall have been focussed on exploring the world of creative writing. Some mini-sagas and poetry have been published, with lots of keen Park Hall parents eager to own their own copies of their child's work.

Park Hall Academy was successful in reaching the final of 'The Poem', a Solihull-wide poetry competition. Several students and their families were invited along to the Presentation Evening where they met performance poets, the Birmingham Poet Laureate and the Mayor.

This builds on successes from the last academic year when over twenty students had their work published in The Young Writers' Poetry Anthology. In English lessons, students from Years 7-11 were asked to write a poem expressing their own personalities or individual beliefs. Over half of the Academy's entries were published in the anthology, which contained poems selected by a panel of judges, based on the author's creativity and expression, with themes ranging from family to pets and dreams! Well done to all our young poets!

Year 6 were also encouraged to get artistic with their poetic writing when they came to Park Hall Academy for sessions in the English Department. They created some wonderful examples of acrostic poetry (poems which use the initial letters of a word to start each line) and collaborative poetry writing.

'Let's get writing' encouraged everyone to become involved and resulted in some impressively artistic use of words around the theme of 'Alice in Wonderland'. Some of the short stories that resulted are now are on display, demonstrating some wonderful aspects of tension building and scene setting.

#### Drop Everything and Read!

Students have also been involved in reading projects such as the 'Drop Everything and Read' programme in which lessons focus on the importance of developing students' reading, which is of course an extremely important skill.

For example reading teaches you about the world around you. Through reading, you will learn about people, places and events outside you own experience; exposing you to ways of life, ideas and beliefs about the world which may be different from those you normally experience.

Whilst reading is a form of learning that is important for its own sake, it also builds an invaluable store of background knowledge and understanding which helps younger children learn to read confidently and well.

#### Chatterbooks

Students and tutors involved in 'Chatterbooks' had a mini reunion on Friday 29 November to celebrate the success of the unique literacy programme delivered by Coventry University.

In addition to building an appreciation of a variety of authors and genres, the students created their own stories and designed artwork which were published as amazing books.

Chatterbooks students were given the opportunity to browse through scrap books containing special memories from the ten workshops they attended. They were all awarded with a copy of their own published work. Well done to the all the Park Hall Chatterbooks students.

#### Punctuation

To encourage students to think about punctuation more carefully, some of our Key Stage 3 English classes have been taking a new approach to punctuation; combining capital letters, full stops and more, with Kung-Fu!

Our students have been taught some punctuation-based moves and have been putting them into practice, demonstrating that they know where the correct punctuation should go and then, transferring these skills to their written work.

Park Hall staff and students are working hard to be as creative as possible in lessons making learning fun and enjoyable to ensure students fulfil their potential.
